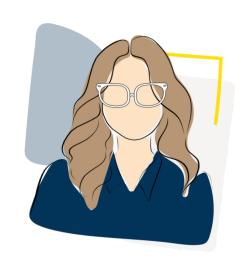

HOW TO CREATE YOUR MARKETING PLAN

Your marketing plan should meet 3 needs for your business:

- growth & discovery
- nurturing & engagement
- evaluation & conversion

Growth & discovery marketing comprises the marketing activities that put your business in front of new eyes and grow your audience. It helps you earn the attention of folks who can eventually become buyers.

Nurturing & engagement marketing includes the activities that strengthen relationships with people who are already paying attention. It educates them on their problems and potential solutions. It helps them form an idea of your brand and what you stand for. It speaks to their needs and concerns directly.

Evaluation & conversion marketing is made up of the activities that guide potential buyers toward a sales conversation or decision. It introduces your offer, addresses potential objections, elucidates how your offer is different from the competition, and shares stories of people you've worked with before.

Depending on the maturity of your business, you might deal with a number of common challenges related to not having your marketing plan fully fleshed out across these 3 areas:

Growth Without Conversion: You have a large audience but sales are hard to come by. Your conversion rates are low. Those who do buy are only aware of "superficial" problems or desires.

Nurturing Without Growth: Your audience is "tapped out." Those who will buy have already bought. Sales may start strong but slow down over time.

Conversion Without Nurturing: Your audience doesn't "get" your offer. You field a lot of questions and have higher refund rates. Buyers are often unprepared for what they've bought.

Is your business suffering from one of these challenges? Which part of your marketing plan needs some work based on that challenge?

Note that this Marketing Plan template isn't geared to planning out or learning a particular system for marketing (i.e. automated email funnel or a webinar system or Facebook advertising). Instead, it's designed to help you identify where you want to put your energy so that you can better direct yourself to learn or build the systems that are going to work best for you.

The template below includes suggestions for activities that fit into each of the 3 core marketing needs for your business. But of course, this is not an exhaustive list! Your business might benefit from a completely different tactic or approach.

Try not to focus on the marketing activities or tactics themselves and, instead, aim to identify how your business needs to connect with people at each stage of the process.

Also, don't assume that just because we've broken out each of these 3 core needs into their own separate section that it requires you to come up with a whole system for each or that moving customers through these stages will take a long time.

When each of these needs are met (for instance, in a webinar or an affiliate marketing opportunity), a potential customer can turn into a buyer very quickly.

Finally, aim to meet each marketing need as simply as possible.

Your business likely doesn't need 5 growth & acquisition systems, 3 nurturing & engagement systems, and 4 evaluation & conversion systems! Focus on 1 high-impact activity for each need—or find a way to address multiple needs in one activity.

Once you've created your Marketing Plan, it's time to operationalize it.

- Use the Standard Operating Procedure template to flesh out any recurring systems that need to be better defined or optimized
- Use the Project Brief template to document one-off projects that need to be completed to fulfill your plan

GROWTH & DISCOVERY

Marketing that grows your audience

Who do we want to attract to our audience?

SAMPLE MARKETING ACTIVITIES

Going on a podcast to talk about a common problem you solve Your business is introduced to a new audience and you connect with them by sharing how to overcome a common challenge.
Writing articles based on common search queries Grab the attention of people searching for solutions or questions with informative & comprehensive articles that show off your unique point of view
Creating social media content that's designed to be shared When your content is shared, it's introduced to new people who haven't come in contact with your brand before.
Speaking at conferences about a goal you can help with Speaking on stage or giving workshops gives you instant credibility with a brand new audience of engaged potential customers

SAMPLE MARKETING ACTIVITIES

Writing a newsletter that connects common pain points to solutions you provide Newsletters are a reliable way to regularly communicate with people who have expressed interest in what your business does
Hosting a podcast that builds a relationship with listeners Podcasts create a sense of intimacy with your potential customers and give you a platform for sharing deeper, more valuable content
Creating social media content that's designed start a conversation When your content is designed to get a response, you open a dialogue between you and your potential customers
Presenting a webinar to share your unique point of view Workshops, roundtables, and webinars give you a chance to engage your audience on a deep level with personal responses to questions & chat messages

SAMPLE MARKETING ACTIVITIES

Hosting a demo of your product or service Showing off your product or service gives people a glimpse of how they could use it to get results
Sharing customer testimonials The best people to speak for your product or service are the people who love it. Don't be afraid to share their enthusiasm!
Creating social media content that's designed tell people about your offer Some of your social media content should directly & explicitly share
your offer and invite people to learn more or buy.
Writing case studies Case studies are valuable content in and of themselves because they often highlight insider information on how problems are overcome but they're also great for showing off the results of your offer

STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE

A Standard Operating Procedure is the process you use to complete a given task in the same way, every time.

Every business has unique processes that are core to its administration, marketing, value delivery, team management, etc... An SOP is how you document those procedures so that you can streamline and improve those processes or delegate them to a team member.

When we create an SOP, we like to include any links, templates, or commonly used information directly in the procedure so that we have easy access to it.

Complete an SOP for every process your business uses. Instead of trying to create the process from scratch or by memory, document the procedure as you do the task. This will give you the most accurate set of steps and help you incorporate this work into your current workload.

Tip: you don't have to be the person to creates all the SOPs. Ask your team members to create an SOP the next time they do a task that is often repeated.

PROJECT BRIEF

A project is a concrete unit of work on your business.

Projects are things like redesigning your customer onboarding system, building a new product, launching your podcast, completing a marketing challenge, or taking a course to learn a new skill.

They are specific, actionable, and have a clear endpoint.

Projects typically take 4-8 weeks to complete. If you anticipate that a project will take more time than that, we recommend breaking down into smaller projects.

Your Project Brief is an opportunity to slow down and get your head around your new project. It helps you decide on an endpoint, take your resources into account, connect the work you're doing to your Strategic Priorities & vision.

It's also a great tool for getting buy-in from your team and determining what support you might need from others to get the job done.

Use this Project Brief Template before starting work on any project.

We use it as part of our quarterly planning process and complete a brief when we add projects to the plan. You might also use it as part of an annual or mid-year planning/review process.
